Beginning in the year 2017 – Graduation requirement	WI Civics Graduation Requirement	WI Act 55 (2015) is the 2015-17 biennial state budget. There is a requirement in Act 55 that any students graduating from a Wisconsin high school (starting with the class of 2017) "takes a civics test comprised of 100 questions that are identical to the 100 questions that may be asked of an individual during the process of applying for U.S. citizenship by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services and the pupil correctly answers at least 60 of those questions." (Section 3266R, 118.33(1m)(a)1.)	For 10 th grade students at the end of the American History course. For 11 th and 12 grade students, watch for information from the guidance department on how to fulfill this requirement.
